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Question What are the unmet needs of breast cancer survivors during the survivorship phase, including marginalized populations, and what resources and models of care are available to address these needs?

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Population: Breast Cancer Survivors

Our population will include breast cancer survivors (individuals of any age, gender, or ethnicity diagnosed with breast cancer, encompassing those currently undergoing treatment, in remission, or post-treatment), which may or may not be marginalized populations (breast cancer survivors from marginalized groups, such as transgender individuals, racial/ethnic minorities, socioeconomically disadvantaged individuals, and those with limited access to healthcare resources).

Concept: Unmet needs and survivorship care

Our concept is defined as unmet needs (studies addressing the unmet physical, psychological, social, and informational needs of breast cancer survivors, reported by survivors themselves, healthcare providers, or caregivers) and survivorship care (literature focusing on survivorship care interventions, support services, resources, and programs targeting the needs of breast cancer survivors during and after treatment).

Context: Worldwide

Studies conducted in any geographical location or healthcare setting to provide a comprehensive understanding of breast cancer survivorship care practices across diverse populations and healthcare systems.
